

2014 OCS AT FORT KNOX 1965-1968 REUNION

The 2014 reunion for members of the classes of OCS at Fort Knox 1965-1968 was held October 9-12, 2014 at the Crowne Plaza Airport Louisville, Kentucky. 172 graduates, 9 cadre members, and 102 guests participated at some point in the reunion activities. From all reports it appears that everyone had a very good time, and thoroughly enjoyed spending the weekend together, visiting, sightseeing, eating and relaxing in the hotel.



Registration began on Thursday shortly after noon. Attendees checked in with Premier Reunions and then headed to the hospitality room to look at the great displays set up by Hugh Preacher and company! Folks arrived non-stop from noon up until (and after) the welcome reception began at 5:00. The breezeway area between the registration desk, the hospitality room and the banquet rooms where the meals were held was a great place for viewing hugs and hand shakes and long awaited greetings!

Doug Burmester emceed the welcome reception and welcomed everyone to the reunion. With the large numbers of classes and class members, it was difficult for some of the smaller individual class members to find their classmates, so Doug used the time at the reception to read the class numbers and asked the members of each of the classes to stand and be recognized so their classmates could find them. Once the reading of the list was complete, the hors d'oeuvres line opened and everyone was able to enjoy time together getting reacquainted and making plans for the remainder of the evening.

Friday morning began with a breakfast buffet in the banquet area, and then it was time to load up the FIVE busses for the much anticipated tour to Fort Knox. Bus tickets had been preassigned and everyone did a great job getting on the right bus. In a very short amount of time they were all loaded and ready to depart!

The forty-five minutes it took to reach Ft Knox passed quickly with the graduates waiting to see what they would recognize first. After a brief security check at the main gate, Mr John Campbell from Public Affairs Office met the busses. After a short introduction and preview of the planned activities all five busses went to the Patton Museum for final instructions. Here, after picking up guides, three of the five of the busses left for a windshield tour of the post while two busloads stayed

in place for a tour of the Patton Museum. The Museum featured numerous artifacts about the famous general, including one of his staff cars. An interesting note is this car was "liberated" from the Germans who also used it as a staff car. It is not known how the Germans came into possession of the vehicle. Also on display was Patton's steel pot with four stars. Numerous other exhibits depicting the use of armor in combat were on display.

About 10:20 busses 3, 4, and 5 came back to the museum and busses 1 and 2 departed for a riding tour of Ft Knox. A slow drive by of the old OCS barracks was made, but unfortunately the buildings are occupied by other units and it was not possible to go inside the buildings where the then candidates were housed. Although only a drive-by only was disappointing, it did bring back memories. Keep in mind that the Ft Knox Post Commander dictates visiting areas and with exception of the mess hall and museum we were not allowed in any of the facilities. During the drive-thru we saw Ireland Army Hospital (now the oldest Army hospital in the USA, built in 1957), the post chapel, family housing, including general officer quarters and troop barracks. Also bear in mind that although the busses followed the same path, the individual bus guides may have pointed out different attractions, so it is possible that you did not see something listed here, or conversely, something not listed.

Lunch was in the main dining facility (formerly called a mess hall). Some former candidates were surprised at the lay out and variety of food offered in the dining facility. There was a short order section for hamburger-type food, made to order pizza, the more traditional meals featuring marinated pork chops, stuffed bell peppers, potatoes, vegetables, a great salad bar, two choices of soup, a dessert counter and a choice of beverages including milk, juice or soft drinks.

Following lunch the highlight of the day was a visit to the USMCR tank element on Ft Knox, Company E, 4th Tank Battalion. Marines from Company E had a variety of armored vehicles - wheeled and tracked – on display. Drawing the most interest were the two workable M1A1 Main Battle Tanks (interesting how the Marines didn't call it the "Abrams" M1A1). Members of the group were allowed to climb on the tanks and walk around the guns and even go inside. Some of the ladies even got into the act, climbing aboard and looking at the weapons and getting an appreciation of what their husbands and the tank crew did to help preserve our freedoms. Final act at Company E was a short demonstration of the moving tank, and swinging its main gun around. Everyone enjoyed the visit and our thanks to the US Marines for their hospitality and professionalism. You helped make our day! The group returned to the Crowne Plaza around 1530 hrs.

Meanwhile, back at the hotel registration resumed and members kept arriving. The hospitality room served its purpose quite nicely for the new arrivals, giving them a place to gather while waiting for the tour to return. Once the Ft Knox group returned it was old home week. Some folks stayed in the hospitality room to reminisce but others chose another part of the hotel that served spirited refreshments.

Friday's dinner was in the hotel featuring a two entrée dinner buffet of southern fried chicken (not to be confused with Kentucky's other fried chicken) and pot roast and an assortment of vegetables, potatoes, salads and desserts. Following dinner each class was asked to stand and be recognized. A couple or (three) classes had only one member present but their new found friends helped them "sound off" so their class numbers appeared to be much higher. Following the "introductions" there was an open mike where graduates were asked to share their personal memories of OCS. Many graduates took advantage of the opportunity and spoke about their time in OCS and how it had impacted the remainder of their lives. Some of the stories told how then candidates tried to (and sometimes did) outwit the TACs; and how sometimes their schemes didn't work so well. Toward the end of the evening, a few of the ladies came forward and shared their experiences and recollections of their husbands/boyfriends while they were in OCS. Whether they were career soldiers or left the Army after their obligated term, they all agreed that attending OCS was a significant part of their education.

Saturday was a little more laid back than Friday was - some folks slept in, some went on the tour to the Slugger museum and the Louisville Belle boat ride. For Group A the first stop was the Louisville Slugger bat factory and museum. There's only one...Louisville Slugger Museum & Factory. It takes a special place to craft the Official Bat of Major League Baseball. Experience history-in-the-making as you stroll through the factory where world famous Louisville Slugger baseball bats are made. The Louisville Slugger Museum is home of the World's Biggest Baseball Bat and offers interactive exhibits along with a bat factory tour and batting cages. OCS graduates with the group visiting the Louisville Slugger Museum were supposed to receive a mini souvenir bat with the OCS at Ft Knox group logo burned on the bat. The bat snafu began when the specially imprinted souvenir bats that were supposed to be given out were not. They nowhere to be found. The bats were eventually located, two weeks later, under a receptionist's desk at the bat factory. Then the bats were shipped to the PRS office so that they could be individually mailed out to the participants. The bats were placed in shipping tubes (after three attempts to get the right size mailing tubes), labeled, and taken to the post office to have the postage applied and sent out to the tour members.

But, lo and behold, what should arrive back at the PRS office the next week? The box of bats! Someone at the post office put the mailing tubes back in the carton that the tubes came in, closed it up, gave the carton to UPS and sent them back to me! It was unreal! So they were taken back to the post office and mailed again!

Departing the bat factory at approximately 11:15 the group was off to the Louisville Belle for an Oktoberfest luncheon cruise. It's a rousing good time on the historic Belle of Louisville for this three-hour Oktoberfest cruise! Live music and a
German-style theme livened up the afternoon, and it was great fun. The cruise included a scrumptious lunch buffet. Other than the bat snafu, all those who participated in the tours on Saturday seemed to have a very good time.

Tour B (Bats and Bridles Tour) departed an hour later than Group A and their first stop was the Louisville Slugger bat factory and museum. An impressive 120-foot tall baseball bat welcomed them to the museum. Everyone watched fascinated at how the bats are handcrafted -much as they were when the first Louisville Slugger was turned in 1884. The priceless bat used by Babe Ruth is on display and a breathtaking interactive display lets you stand at home plate receiving 90 mile per hour fastballs. Everyone took the time to browse the history of "America's Pastime" featuring mementos from Babe Ruth to Ken Griffey, Jr. Group B was not scheduled to receive the specialty bats so that problem was not encountered. Then they were off to Churchill Downs and the Kentucky Derby Museum.

Churchill Downs is most famous for the Kentucky Derby but hosts many other races during the racing season. During Derby Week in May of each year thousands of visitors descend upon Louisville with a mere 100,000 or so attending the Derby. The tour of Churchill Downs provided some insight into the life behind the scenes, for trainers and jockeys. Lunch was at the Derby Café.

The Kentucky Derby Museum houses over 20,000 items consisting of both artifact and library materials. Artifact collections include items belonging to renowned trainers H.A. "Jimmy" Jones and Woodford C. "Woody" Stephens and world famous jockey Bill Shoemaker. Library collections consist of books, photos, periodicals, manuscripts and film and video and include written and printed materials documenting the history of Churchill Downs from 1875 to the present day. One of the Museum's featured research collections is that of turf and sports writer Jim Bolus. This collection consists of newspaper articles, handwritten notes, photos and audio interviews documenting the history of the Kentucky Derby and Thoroughbred racing from 1875-1995. Clicking on the "Begin Search" link

on the museum's web-page will take you to a search engine that provides an overview of the contents of the Bolus Collection.

Saturday evening was the highlight of the reunion. Almost everyone started off in the hospitality room to have their picture made (modern terminology is "image captured") for the memory book, then enjoyed a few moments of the cocktail hour preceding the banquet. The doors to the banquet room were opened and the banquet began. We were honored to have a Color Guard from Fort Knox with us to present the colors to open the banquet. Dan Leifel emceed the banquet and led the group in the pledge of allegiance and National Anthem. After a few welcome remarks, dinner was served. After dinner, the group was pleased to present Doug Burmester, the originator of the group, with a specially autographed and framed signature board in appreciation of all his hard work and diligence in getting the group together. Following the presentation, Doug spoke to the group about the history of organization - what the events were that led him to searching for individual members and how that grew into a list of all the classes and all the classmates from all the classes from 1965 through 1968. After Doug's talk on the group history, two of the TAC officers spent a few minutes telling the group what it had been like from their perspective during their time at OCS. The banquet came to a close when the members of the Color Guard returned to the front of the banquet room, and retired the colors.

Folks remained in the banquet room and the adjoining hallway for quite some time after the banquet, saying their last good byes and getting in one more hug or handshake.

The breakfast on Sunday morning was the last official event of the reunion, and then, suddenly, it was over. See you next time in 2016!


